 - \$30M GF: FY 24: LEO Recruitment and Retention
 - Centralized Staffing Information
 - Program Lead
 - 10 Regional recruiters
 - Communication Coordinator
 - Hub for information on vacancies, application processes, training enrollment, salaries and benefits
 - Marketing
 - National, regional, local marketing campaign
 - Dedicated web site and app
 - Evaluating Incentives
 - Sign-on bonus
 - Relocation reimbursement
 - Referral bonus
 - Educational incentives



- Operation Bold Blue Line (OBBL) Continued
 - Higher-Ed Partnering
 - College and University on-site recruitment
 - HBCU's
 - Community Colleges recruitment
 - Fraternal organization outreach
 - Field of study outreach; Criminal Justice, Criminology, Psychology



Operation Ceasefire

- \$20M GF: FY24
 - Provide additional funding for local and state programs to address gun violence in Virginia communities
 - In December 2022, DCJS received 30 requests for funding and were able to fund 17
 - Examples of program areas that could be funded with additional resources:
 - Local Prosecutors
 - Local group violence reduction coordinators and services
 - Localized Training
 - Expansion of Regional Task-force support
 - Local criminal justice planners
 - Local needs assessments



- Virginia Mass Violence Care Fund
 - \$10M GF: FY24
 - Would be available 3 years after the mass violence event and cover expenses not covered by insurance
 - Funding would remain in perpetuity
 - Focus would be on providing coverage for health care and mental health care related expenses for identified mass violence victims



Victim Witness Grant Fund

- \$1,320,878 NGF: FY24
 - Increase in NGF appropriation. V/W grants funded from; Federal Victim of Crime (VOCA) funds, Special Funds (fines/fees), and General Funds
 - VOCA funding continues to decline
 - Allows DCJS to increase use of the V/W special fund to keep programs whole as long as it's sustainable



- Regulatory Credentialing System
 - \$500K GF: FY23
 - Provide funding to obtain a new regulatory credentialing management system
 - Supports credentialing/regulation of:
 - Private Security individuals and businesses
 - Bail Bondsman
 - Bail Enforcement agents
 - Special Conservators of the Peace
 - Tow truck drivers
 - Not collecting sufficient fee revenue to fund new system



- Law Enforcement Hiring Initiatives
 - \$100,328 GF: FY24
 - 1 FTE and funding to coordinate efforts to recruit former military law enforcement personnel to Virginia law enforcement agencies
 - Coordinate with military Skill Bridge program to enhance law enforcement recruitment efforts



- Internet Crime Against Children (ICAC)
 - \$100K GF: FY24 Southern Virginia ICAC Task Force
 - Address reduction in collection of special fund fines/fees that along with existing GF's provide funding for ICAC programming
