

# Firearm Violence Intervention and Prevention Grant Fund (FY23 & FY24)

- Virginia Firearm Violence Intervention and Prevention Fund (FVIP)
  - \$4M in FY23 and \$9M in FY24, Chapter 1
  - At least \$1.5M each year to localities with disproportionate firearm-related homicides to support crime intervention and prevention through community engagement, including youth programs
  - At least \$500,000 in FY23 for Portsmouth and at least \$1M in FY23 for Norfolk
- 3% for DCJS Administration

# Firearm Violence Intervention and Prevention Grant Fund (FY23 & FY24)

- ...available to agencies of local government, community-based organizations, and hospitals for the purpose of supporting implementation of evidence-informed gun violence intervention and prevention efforts, including street outreach, hospital-based violence intervention, and other violence intervention programs.
- Grant funds shall also support firearm suicide prevention and safe firearm removal practices from persons prohibited from possessing a firearm, including subjects of domestic violence protective orders, persons convicted of prohibitory crimes, and persons subject to substantial risk orders.

# Firearm Violence Intervention and Prevention Awards (FY23 & FY24)

Awarded \$5M of FVIP funds available for FY2023 & FY2024 for Hospital Violence Intervention and Prevention Initiative

• 1 grant for 6 hospitals

Awarded \$1.5M of FVIP funds to Portsmouth & Norfolk

Awarded \$199,587 for 1-year FVIP grants (possible cont.)

 5 awards to nonprofit organizations Awarded \$1,025,594 of FVIP for grants for local coordination, assessment, and planning

 6 awards to local government agencies



# Firearm Violence Intervention and Prevention Grant Fund (FY23 & FY24)

### **FUNDING DISTRIBUTION**



- Operation Ceasefire Grant Fund
  - -\$2.5M in FY23 and \$17.5M in FY24, Chapter 1
- 3% for DCJS Administration

- Used solely for the purposes of implementing violent crime reduction strategies, providing training for law-enforcement officers and prosecutors, providing equipment for law-enforcement agencies, and awarding grants to organizations such as state and local lawenforcement agencies, local attorneys for the Commonwealth, localities, social services providers, and nonprofit organizations that are engaged in group violence intervention efforts...
- 'Group violence intervention' means comprehensive law enforcement, prosecutorial, and community-based initiatives, substantially similar to Operation Ceasefire as implemented in Boston, Massachusetts and the Gang Reduction Programs implemented in Richmond and Los Angeles, California.

Operation Ceasefire Awards (FY23 & FY24) Awarded all Ceasefire funds initially appropriated for FY23 and FY24




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#### **FUNDS DISTRIBUTION**



### **GRANT DISTRIBUTION**




- Safer Communities Program
  - \$10M in FY24, Chapter 1
  - \$9.5 to pilot localities: Cities of Norfolk, Portsmouth, and Richmond

- Support holistic, community-based strategies that address the root causes and conditions of community violence
- Evidence-informed and/or community-driven
  - Afterschool programs and mentorships
  - Connections to education and economic opportunities
  - Trauma-informed mental health care
  - Credible messengers and violence interrupters
  - Strategies to build trust between law enforcement agencies and community stakeholders

- Requires each of these localities to employ a full-time position dedicated to planning, implementation, and coordination of community violence reduction strategies, including existing violence reduction grants
- In November 2023, DCJS made awards to the three named localities

### Timeline of Related Funding (FY21 & FY22)

- FY2021 & FY2022 \$2,645,244 in Gun Violence Intervention and Prevention funding the first year and \$193,658 the second year and two positions to make competitive grants to five localities to support evidence-based gun violence intervention and prevention initiatives
- FY2021 \$150,000 in Youth Gang and Community Violence
   Assessments for community assessments for youth and gang
   violence prevention initiatives in Hampton, Newport News,
   Norfolk, Richmond, Roanoke, and Petersburg


### Timeline of Related Funding (FY21 & FY22)

- FY2022 \$2.5M in *American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA)* funds for groups providing community-based gun violence reduction or youth and gang violence intervention programming through initiatives including, but not limited to, Gang Reduction and Youth Development and Operation Ceasefire models
- FY2022 \$200,000 in ARPA funds for one-time appropriation to
   Chesapeake for the purchase of equipment to analyze firearms evidence
- FY2022 \$800,000 in ARPA funds for one-time appropriation to Hampton to support employment program for court-involved youth and adults facing barriers to employment, expand services for those participating in/at-risk of gun violence, and provide counseling or mental health services for those exposed to violence

# Office of Safer Communities Next Steps

### Office of Safer Communities

- Establishes an Office of Safer Communities at DCJS which will serve as a resource for research, evidence, and best practices for community-based violence intervention
- Encompasses the existing firearms violence reduction funds including Firearms Violence Intervention and Prevention and Operation Ceasefire
- \$500,000 to DCJS to Support the Office of Safer Communities
  - Coordination, Outreach, Capacity Building
  - Performance Measure Reporting
  - Research and Evidence

### Next Steps



Provide localities with more direct technical assistance for capacity building, planning, and sustainability Identify and implement standardized metrics for reporting under these programs Issue new grant solicitation for FVIP (Non-Profits) and OCGP (Law Enforcement & Community Based Organizations)

### Next Steps

- Continue to equip localities to ensure they are better positioned to move forward with programs designed to address their specific needs in the areas of long-term violence intervention and prevention:
  - Requiring local assessments
  - Encouraging the hiring of local criminal justice planners who can focus on bringing all local players together and coordinating efforts at the local level
  - Engaging local Community Criminal Justice Boards which include judges, prosecutors, law enforcement, local government, and others for multiple purposes
- Enhance research on violence reduction strategies to serve as a clearinghouse for state, local, and community organizations

### Next Steps

- Enhance and increase training for professionals serving impacted communities on violence reduction strategies and with response to community trauma
- Assist with the development and reporting of performance measures, along with incorporating an evaluation to allow course corrections if needed.
- Enhance community collaboration by providing training and support to nonprofits
- Schedule regional meetings for community-based organizations (CBOs) to increase collaboration and provide technical assistance addressing sustainability and capacity building
